

LCCC ARTICULATION (TRANSFER) AGREEMENTS

In addition to the Ohio Transfer 36 (OT36), which ensures transfer and applicability of courses between Ohio public colleges and universities, LCCC has secured articulation agreements with select public and private colleges and universities. Articulation agreement pathways are intended as a general guideline for course and degree completion. Student should consult an advisor for detailed information regarding updated course articulations, curriculum changes, requirements at the transfer institution and general assistance in making the transfer experience as seamless as possible.

LCCC seeks to secure agreements with upper division institutions of higher education to facilitate successful transfer of its graduates.

Students interested in pursuing a pathway available through articulation agreement should work with their LCCC academic advisor or the University Partnership Transfer Coordinator to establish an academic plan prior to transfer.

Responsibilities of Students

To facilitate transfer with maximum applicability of transfer credit, prospective transfer students should plan a course of study that will meet the requirements of a degree program at the receiving institution. Specifically, students should identify an institution and major to which they desire to transfer early in their collegiate studies. Furthermore, students should determine if there are language requirements or any special course requirements that can be met during the first or second year. This will enable students to plan and pursue a course of study that will articulate with the receiving institution's major. Students are encouraged to seek further information regarding transfer from their LCCC advisor, the University Partnership transfer coordinator and admissions representatives from the college or university to which they plan to transfer.
